

To Seek Change
 The present bed-need boundaries, established by census tracts and defined as "State Plan Area 91-R" by the State Bureau of Hospitals, are believed by local industrialists to cut through the city in such a manner that several large industrial properties are not included in Area 91-R, but are placed in the Hawthorne-Inglewood territory. Should this be established as a fact at the Berkeley conference, immediate application will be made to revise the boundaries to include the entire City of Torrance as well as the South Bay area.
