Paid Your 1957 Auto Fees Yet? If Not, It'll Cost Time or Cash

If you haven't paid your 1957 car registration fees yet, you'll probably be out either some time or money.

If you pay your fees tomorrow, the last day to register without penalty, you'll probably have to stand in line. Carlos Caldwell, manager of the Torrance office of the Department of Motor Vehicles reported that only half of the expected 60,000 local registrations had been completed by the middle of last week. The local office is at a new location, 1907 Border Ave.

Penalty Fees
If you don't complete the 1957 registration tomorrow, you'll be out penalty fees, ranging up to 100 per cent in some cases.

When making payment by mail, the envelope containing the fees must be postmarked not later than midnight tomorrow night.

Many motorists will not have received pre-punched cards containing the statement of

amount of fees due, but failure to receive such cards does not relieve the owners of responsibility to register before the deadline.

Why No Cards
Some of the reasons why some motorists did not receive the pre-punched cards are given by Motor Vehicle Director Paul Mason:

1. Failure of owners to report to the Department of Motor Vehicles changes of address.

2. When vehicles were purchased in the late weeks of 1956.

3. Transfer of title to vehicles late last year either through sale or refinancing.

Procedure Told

"Motorists who for any reason did not receive a prepared statement of fees are required to renew their registration by submitting the 1956 stub of white slip," Mason explained. Such renewals must be taken in person to regular DMV offices.

All of Torrance Placed in Bay's Hospital Area

All of Torrance is considered to be in the South Bay area for hospital purposes, according to a statement made by the California State Bureau of Hospitals.

The action was taken by bureau officials, with the approval of Dr. Malcolm H. Merrill, director of public health, after a group of Torrance industry and hospital representatives went to Berkeley Tuesday to seek the boundary clarification.

Boundary Divided
Until Gordon R. Cumming, chief of the bureau, announced the decision, it was believed that at least half of the larger industrial properties in Torrance were in the Inglewood-Hawthorne area.

The bureau declared that Torrance, El Segundo, Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach, and Palms Verdes Estates were considered to have a "community of interest for hospital purposes."

Making the trip to Berkeley were Robert I. Plomert, General Petroleum Corp., representing the Chamber of Commerce; Fred Mill, National Supply Co., representing the Torrance Industries Tax Committee; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas J. O'Dwyer, representing the Little Company of Mary Hospital, and Leonard Ensminger, representing Torrance Memorial Hospital.

Plomert explained that his firm and others which might have been excluded from the Torrance and South Bay area could not participate financially in the Little Company of Mary Hospital drive until it was determined that their allegiance was solely to hospitals in this area.

Conucil to Receive Park Lighting Plan

Plans to increase the night lighting facilities at Walteria, El Retiro, and McMaster park through funds from the 1957-58 budget were advanced this week by Harry Van Bellehem, director of recreation for Torrance.

In a memorandum to City Manager George Stevens, Van Bellehem said he had investigated the cost of night lighting of El Retiro tennis courts, the Walteria all-purpose game courts, patio and playground equipment areas, and the McMaster parking lot, basketball court, and playground areas. Lighting the El Retiro tennis courts would cost about \$3795, the recreation official estimated, and would include six overhead lights per court, and coin meters whereby tennis fans could turn the lights on by inserting a coin in the meter.

\$5000 Needed
About \$5000 would be needed to light the parking lot, and other areas of McMaster park, he said, while another \$5450 would be needed for the additional Walteria lighting. Night lighting of the park

areas mentioned would extend their usefulness to the community, Van Bellehem stated. The installation of sprinklers and other facilities, although needed, would not extend the usefulness of the park areas, he said.

The council will consider his recommendations at its 5:30 p.m. meeting Tuesday.

License Probed
Other matters to come before the city fathers include an unofficial hearing into the application of a Walteria cafe for an op-sale liquor license which the city voted recently to protest. Because of the opposition to the city's action by a large number of Walteria residents and businessmen, the Council asked for comments on the matter at Tuesday's meeting.

The Council also will consider a request of Hi-Shear Rivet Tool Co. for permission to install a taxi-strip from its airport plant to the end of the airport runway. The Airport Commission studied the proposal and recommended approval.

Million Dollar Expansion Revealed by Shell Oil Co.

Plans for a one million dollar expansion to its recently announced Wilmington-Dominguez Refinery building program have been revealed by Shell Oil Co.

P. J. Merkus, Shell refinery manager, said yesterday a 200,000 pound boiler will be added to the catalytic cracking unit at the company's re-

finery to provide additional steam capacity for the new platforming unit now under construction.

A special feature of the boiler facility is that it will convert waste gases in the catalytic cracking unit effluent to useful heat.

Additional steam demands for the multi-million dollar expansion of the Shell Chemical Corporation plant adjacent to the Wilmington-Dominguez refinery will also be met by the installation of the boiler.
