Torrance's easy win over the Seahawks kept the Tartars in the race for the league crown, although the Santa Monica Vikings maintained their two-game lead by downing Centennial 49-46. The Vikings came from behind to beat the Centennial quintet. They outscored the Cents 21-12 in the final quarter to salvage the win.

Torrance's leading scorers, Ruffell and Jerry Matthews accounted for 49 of the Tartar's 67 points in the Friday night tussle. Ruffell was the league's leading scorer going into the fray, and lengthened his lead during the evening with his 32-point onslaught.

**EL SEGUNDO DROPS NHS BY 63-47**

North High School's Saxons were still looking for their first league win Friday night after dropping a 63-47 decision to the El Segundo Eagles in a game which was fairly close most of the way.

The superior height of the Eagle made the difference in the game as Guards Larry Larson and Dick Clark dropped in 16 and 14 points respectively for the winners. North High's Don Prather scored 14 point to lead the locals.

El Segundo boasted only a three-point bulge at half-time, but moved further ahead and finished the game with a surge of points.
