Thousands of handicapped children over the Southland have their eyes hopefully set on the start of the 1957 Easter Seal Campaign, conducted by the Crippled Children's Society of Los Angeles County, which officially begins tomorrow, March 15, and will continue through April 15.

More than 1,805,000 envelopes bearing the colorful sheets of Easter Seals will go in the mail this week to homes all over Los Angeles County. In addition, Paul Dietrich, president of the society, announced that more than 5000 coin containers will be distributed to business establishments throughout the County, with the exception of the city of Los Angeles.

"We hope that Los Angeles County residents will reaffirm their support of the Easter Seal Campaign by giving generously when the Seals arrive in their mail boxes and by using the Seals whenever possible," Dietrich said. He also pointed out that this year's Seals will incorporate a window sticker indicating "We Have Given."

Folks, it seems the time has come for us to start asking for additional facilities here in our town. The help I have in mind is for a full-time library. At the present writing we are served by the library on 242nd St. one block west of Hawthorne Blvd. This library, although called the "Walteria" library, serves the entire area here in South Torrance, including Hollywood Riviera (which incidentally has signed up many borrowers), Seaside Heights, Seaside Ranchos, Victoria Knolls, Pacific Hills, and others. Our library facilities have improved greatly in the last eight years, but there is still the problem of only having half-day service on two days during the week, and no hours on Friday. Let's take a look at what our library renders to the members of this community. At present there are 2400 borrowers listed. The circulation reaches a staggering 4500 to 5000 books a month, with a total last year of 55,000. We have only one full-time librarian with a part-time helper which is very inadequate to the demands now made on the service.

Individual service has always been a motto of the local branch, but unless something is done to relieve the heavy burden of circulation now resting on little help and few hours, the service is bound to suffer. Our library now stands number 38 in the list of 115 county library branches. Don't you think we could start to ask for a 48-hour week? Let's see what we can do about getting a full time library established here for the immense area it must serve.
