District Has 10 Grants For Teachers

The Torrance Unified School District has again received authorization for 10 elementary teacher training scholarships from the school of education, University of Southern California. A grant of \$600 is made available to those nominated for the scholarships. Interested persons holding a bachelor of arts degree received prior to July 1, 1955, and who do not have the necessary training to teach in an elementary school, are invited to call the personnel office of the Torrance Unified School District, 2335 Plaza del Amo, FAirfax 8-8080.

The purpose of the teacher education project is to improve the professional training of selected persons to become elementary teachers. The program as outlined will be a positive step in recruiting teachers who do not possess the necessary professional education required for a regular elementary teaching credential. Persons nominated for scholarships will be employed by the school district and will begin their training in June, 1957, and continue through the summer of 1958.

Graduates of the school are generally assigned to shipboard duties upon completion of their training.
