

Apartments Lead Month's Building List

Apartment houses furnished the bulk of large building permits for the first half of March, as a total of \$722,612 in permits was issued, according to Walter Bradford, senior clerk in the city engineer's office.

Heater Blamed For Blaze In Bathroom

A heater was blamed for a fire which badly damaged a bathroom at the W. E. Peters home, 25820 Skylark Dr., early yesterday morning.

The March permits brought the year's total to \$4,353,152. Aside from a permit for a \$56,000 educational unit at the First Lutheran Church, other large permits were for apartment houses.

These included \$156,000 for two seven-unit apartments at 16921 and 16907 Yukon Ave., taken out by Jacob Narod; \$108,000 for six-unit apartments at 329 and 333 Calle Miramar, taken out by R. A. Spooner; \$44,000 for six units at 233 Calle Miramar, taken out by W. B. and L. Korach; \$85,000 for eight units at 309 Calle Miramar, taken out by Frank Norris; and \$38,600 for

units at 2244 Redondo Beach Blvd., planned by Roy Lynd.

Measles Lead Disease List in Torrance Area

Cases of measles continued to lead the diseases reported in the Torrance Health area for the weeks ending March 9, according to the Los Angeles County Health Department.

In an upswing in disease, 11 cases of measles were reported, followed by scarlet fever, 7; mumps, 6; hepatitis and gonorrhea, each 3; and tuberculosis, 2.

The city of Torrance had six cases of scarlet fever, four of measles, and one each of mumps and gonorrhea.

Chef Accused People Like Change Plate Of Cafe Raid

A local chef was jailed Friday night for allegedly making off with some of the cuisine.

Frank A. Fiorino, 38, of Compton, was booked on theft charges as the result of a complaint by Jim Mumolo, manager of the Open Hearth restaurant, 23836 Hawthorne Ave.

Mumolo said he found canned clams, cheese sauce, a roast beef and hamburger in Fiorino's car. He said the food was from the kitchen of the establishment where Fiorino was working as a cook.

Fiorino denied stealing the food, claiming he had purchased it at a market.

Torrance customers now can charge their purchases at Newberry's under one of four different plans:

1. Regular charge account. Each month, the store sends out a statement, with sales slips, payable when the statement is rendered. There is no service charge.


2. Revolving charge account. Each month, the customer receives a statement, but pays only a specified amount of the total each month. Purchases may be made up to a certain

ceiling price, previously agreed upon.

3. Easy payment plan. For larger purchases, the customer may take as long as 18 months to pay with a small service charge. There usually is no down payment.

4. Combination plan. The customer may use any combination of the other three plans to suit his budget. For instance, Plans 1 and 3 might be maintained at the same time. Further information can be obtained at the store, Paget said.
