

Burglars Steal Chamber's Cash

Burglars went on the rampage Thursday night or early Friday, hitting the Chamber of Commerce, the city's parking meter office, a beauty shop, a doctor's office, a nursery, and a private home, Torrance police reported.

Det. Sgt. Ted Morris reported that the culprits broke into the Chamber of Commerce, 1345 El Prado, by breaking a window. They took a total of \$109, including Mutual Ticket Agency funds for the Torrance night at "Around the World in 80 Days," funds of the Downtown Retail Merchants' Assn., and petty cash. The burglars, who apparently used gloves, ransacked both the chamber manager's and the clerical official. A filing cabinet and safe containing the money was pried open.

Bogus Checks Seized

A print shop operator's suspicions caused the downfall of a 21-year-old man who was arrested Thursday on suspicion of forgery of bogus checks for non-existent firms at the Torrance Airport, Torrance Police and Sheriff's Deputies said yesterday.

Eugene Thistle was arrested as he was coming out of a Los Angeles print shop where he had ordered payroll checks and 63 identification cards for the Cargo Air Service, a firm supposedly located at the Torrance Airport.

Campaign Extended

After making a campaign progress report to the State Advisory Hospital Council at Berkeley on April 4th and 5th the Little Company of Mary Hospital Building Fund Campaign has been granted an extension until May 31st to raise its share of the money to qualify for state and federal allocations.

Cities OK Freeway

Attempts to have the State Division of Highways reroute the San Diego Freeway further west in the Lawndale area and bring it through Torrance between 186th St. and 190th St. were vigorously opposed this week by members of the Inter-City Highways Committee, composed of representatives of Torrance and South Bay cities.

Brought up by the Lawndale Chamber of Commerce recently, the suggestion that the freeway be rerouted has been sent to the State in the form of a resolution, members of the committee were informed.

The committee passed a resolution during its April meeting at the Palms Thursday night objecting to the Lawndale suggestion, and reaffirming its approval of the present routing of the proposed inter-regional highway.

New High School

The way was cleared for construction of a new Catholic high school at 5430 Torrance Blvd., as permits for two classroom units valued at \$50,000 were taken out last week, according to Walter Bradford, senior clerk in the city engineer's office.

Officials hope to have the school open by September for Catholic high school students in the South Bay area. The permit for the initial construction was taken out by A. C. Martin.

New Hawthorne Built

Hess Bros. Construction Co. has nearly completed grading on the first leg of an eight-mile extension of Hawthorne Blvd. across Palos Verdes Peninsula from Highway 101

to the ocean, as called for in the county board of supervisors' master plan for the area.

Starting section of the extension runs from Silver Spur Rd. westerly about three-quarters of a mile. Soon it will be followed by a second section continuing from this point westerly to Crest Rd., which was described as an additional distance of approximately a mile and a half.

On the 100-foot-wide right-of-way, a 40-foot-wide highway is to be laid, and this may be doubled in width if and when required.

GOP Names Chairman

Fred Sharlow, petroleum engineer, is the new Republican precinct chairman of the 17th Congressional, according to an announcement this week by Charles Soderstrom, 17th District chairman.

Fitzgerald Elected

Temporary officers were elected of the re-organized Torrance Coordinating Council Wednesday night, according to Mrs. Sara Kalner of the Los Angeles County Community Service Department.

Dick Fitzgerald, manager of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, was elected president with Mervin Schwab of the Torrance Methodist Church selected as vice president. Schwab was Torrance's "Outstanding Citizen of 1953."

Douglas Hikes Pay

Across-the-board pay raises which add nearly \$10,000,000 dollars to the annual payroll were announced by Douglas Aircraft Co. for more than 68,000 hourly-paid workers in California, Arizona and Oklahoma.

Locally, 22,400 employees of the company's El Segundo division, which includes the Torrance facility, will receive annual increases totalling \$5,280,000.

School Gets Money

The Torrance Unified School District will receive \$137,842 in federal funds for current operating expenses, Sen. William F. Knowland said in a telegram to the HERALD yesterday.

The money is allotted to the school district on the basis of the number of children of federal employees attending school here. Additional funds will be allotted at the end of the school year.

Child Dies Suddenly

Graveside services for Thomas Duane Britt, 2-year-old boy who died suddenly at the home of his grandmother here Thursday night, will be held at Green Hills at 10 a.m. Monday morning, with the Rev. L. P. Husted officiating.

Serra Moms Will Elect
