

Modern Medicine's Victories Against Diseases Recognized

"Medical Education Week, April 21-27, will be observed this year in recognition of modern medicine's victories against disease and disability," Justin Dart, prominent Los Angeles business executive and local Medical Education Week chairman, said yesterday.

"Many diseases which just a few short years ago were commonplace are now wiped out," he pointed out. "And remarkable progress is being made in the effort to control the nation's major health menaces—mental illness, heart disease and cancer."

"These victories are being won in the nation's 82 medical schools, three of which are in Los Angeles," Dart emphasized. "Without these medical schools to train the practicing physicians and researchers this amazing progress would not have been possible."

Dart pointed out that research at the College of Medical Evangelists and the Medical Schools of the University of Southern California and the University of California at Los Angeles had contributed much toward making the United States the world's healthiest nation.

Grants Aid Work

"The recognized skills of medical scientists in our three medical schools attracted more than \$5,000,000 in research grants last year from national foundations, government agencies and other outside sources," he said.

Smog Control Citations Up 100 Per Cent

Citations for violation of air pollution laws jumped more than 100 per cent for the first three months of 1957 as compared to the same period last year, according to a report issued by Air Pollution Control Officer Smith Griswold.

Griswold said the District filed 860 court cases during the three month period ending March 31 as compared to 407 cases filed during the same period in 1956, an increase of 111 per cent.

March alone saw an increase of over 95 per cent when the District filed 260 court cases for smog law violations as compared to 138 cases filed during March of 1956.

Action Completed

Court action was completed against 236 defendants last month with 227 pleading guilty or being convicted, while

two were acquitted and seven cases were dismissed.

Court fines assessed totaled \$8,769, more than twice the amount levied last year, while fines collected amounted to \$6,289 as compared to 2,742 collected in March of 1956.

Griswold said 612 smog cases were awaiting action in the Municipal Courts of Los Angeles County at the beginning of April.

The control officer commented that the increased volume of court citations results from the stepped-up program of industrial plant inspections now being administered by Enforcement Director Louis J. Fuller.

Inspections Made

"With 61 inspection and enforcement officers now in the field, we are able to render more than 6000 inspections of

potential air pollution sources each month, thus increasing the over-all effectiveness of our entire industrial air pollution abatement program," Fuller stated.

He noted that approximately 28 per cent of the total staff time available to the District's Enforcement Division is devoted to inspections of industrial plant operations, approximately 18 per cent to inspections of petroleum refineries and petro-chemical plants, and 54 per cent to highway patrols, visual observation of emissions from industrial areas, and to the answering of public complaints.
