Bay Harbor Osteopathic Auxiliary Aids Research

Ballentine Henley, president of the College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons of Los Angeles to be used by the Research Foundation. The balance of the auxiliary's treasury will be given to the California Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons clinic and to the San Pedro Mental Health Clinic. The decisions on the distribution of their philanthropic fund were made at a dinner meeting held at a Manhattan restaurant.

Two years ago a small group of doctors' wives, wanting to serve more effectively their local communities' health needs, broke from their sister body, the Auxiliary to the Long Beach Osteopathic Society to form the Auxiliary to the Bay Harbor unit. The group was guided through its charter year by president, Mrs. Bryce Pizey, of San Pedro. They were able to give generously from their first year's treasury to the San Pedro Mental Health Clinic and to the Scholarship Fund at the College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons.

This year, under the capable leadership of Mrs. Paul D. Yates, of Hermosa Beach, the Auxiliary has continued to grow. To its already existing philanthropic program was added the needs of the Research Foundation at the College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons. Many months ago it became apparent that more land was needed for buildings to house the Research program. Osteopathic Auxiliaries throughout California decided to help purchase that much needed property. The Auxiliary to the Bay Harbor group of physicians immediately launched a series of money-making projects.

Last week, president, Mrs. Paul D. Yates and president-elect, Mrs. Otto Frantich, who was also the chairman of ways and means for the year, proudly presented the auxiliary's check for \$2000 to Dr. W. Ballentine Henley.
