Keeping California's highways clear of litter is the legal responsibility of every driver and passenger of every automobile using our highways says the California Highway Patrol.

"The law prohibits the throwing of cans, bottles, papers, garbage, and other refuse on our highways," declared Patrol Commissioner B. R. Caldwell. "This restriction against litterbugs makes it illegal to scatter trash anywhere along the right-of-way of a public highway.

The Patrol is continuing positive action against violators of this law," Caldwell stated.
