### Need to Oversubscribe '56 Red Cross Quota Stressed

"It is absolutely imperative that we be prepared to over-subscribe our goal this year!" Such was the declaration of Chairman Albert Isen this week, as he urged citizens to enlist in any one of the divisions forming Torrance's 1956 Red Cross campaign organization, which is slated to kick off soliciting activities the first part of next month. Emphasizing that the "tremendous rehabilitation program being undertaken right now by Red Cross" in flood stricken parts of California poses an immediate responsibility on campaign teams this year, Isen indicated that the only obstacle to complete success would be an inadequate volunteer organization. "Top leadership ranks are pretty well filled," he said, "but we are still far short of the 600 workers needed to fill out door-bell ringing levels, in the residential and business divisions. "If we can be sure that the entire area will be covered, I am confident that we shall have no difficulty, whatsoever, in coming up with the goal," asserted Isen, explaining that although the succession of extreme disaster during the past year has placed the Red Cross in a "critical financial position," it has also brought out a "positive side of the picture." "There has never to my knowledge been a more favor-

able public attitude toward the Red Cross. Its philosophy of neighbor helping neighbor has been demonstrated in vivid concrete deeds. Having watched the Red Cross in action, the American people have expressed their approval in no uncertain terms and are anxious to assure the continued operation of all its services. "Thus, our immediate job is to enroll enough volunteers to collect the money that people are waiting to give," concluded Isen in asking residents to volunteer for a "large or small" assignment by calling the Torrance Red Cross campaign headquarters, 2410 Carson St., at FA 8-7002.
