

Tartars Beat Mt. Carmel, Bow To Serra

Spikers Push Apaches; Face Banning Tomorrow

Centennial's Apaches, defending state high school track and field champs, outdistanced Torrance and Bellflower Thursday in a three-way meet at Bellflower.

Although the Apaches looked a lot less impressive than their 1955 team, they still had enough power to pull through. The Varsity contest found the Apaches winning, 64% to Torrance's 45 and Bellflower's 19%.

Again it was the lack of depth that proved the Tartars down-fall.

Tomorrow the locals tangle with Banning High of Wilmington, in a dual meet here. Events start at 3 p.m.

Gary Cooke Wins
Gary Cooke, top Southland sprinter, again took both dashes for Torrance, keeping his unbeaten string intact. His times, 10.3 and 22.4 were comparatively slow, but both sprints were run against the wind.

Myron Schmidt also went on this winning ways, registering a good 52.9 clocking in taking the 440. Skip Smith was the only other Tartar Varsity contestant to win. He took the shot, at 46'3", with teammate Stan Wilson just a shade behind.

Duane Cooke took his first two losses of the season in the hurdles. He had been running

the 70-yard highs and 120-yards, but the distances were lengthened to the regulation 120 and 180-yards respectively Thursday. He was second in both races.

Other Tartar placers included Len Ehlers, second in the 880; Tom Brown, who got third in the 220; Rich Ruffell, third in the broad jump; Larry Denning, second in pole vault, and John Trenary, third in the mile.

Bill Morris was the only Cee winner for Torrance, pushing the shot out of 48'1/2". In Bee events, John Roccoforte, who tossed the shot 47'6", and Jim MacDougal, who won the pole vault at 9'6", were the only first placers for the Tartars.
