Former Herald Reporter Now UP Chief in Pakistan



Crewmen Pass Fifth Year in Safety Record

A record five years without a lost-time accident has been achieved by Southern California Gas Co. crewmen serving the southwest area, company officials reported today.

Crewmen amassed a total of 250,000 man-hours without a lost-time accident according to Division Mgr. E. F. Hawkesworth.

Company Safety Engineer E. E. Taylor presented the crew with a certificate signed by President F. M. Banks. Accepting the award for his crew was District Supervisor F. C. Dalley. Hawkesworth and other company officials present at the ceremony praised Dalley and his crew for their attention to safety policies.

Two Paving Contracts Awarded
