The offer grants wage increases ranging from 7 cents to 15 cents for factory workers, and from 7 cents to 12 cents for technical and office employees. It increases the bonus for second shift employees from the present 5 cents to 15 cents an hour, raises rates for various job classifications and adds other benefits.

Other Benefits
Included among the latter are three weeks of paid vacation after 12 years of service, company pay for time spent on jury duty and the pension plan.

The contract is for a two-year term with expiration on March 31, 1958.

It calls for an additional 7 cents per hour increase at the beginning of the second year in addition to the other increases.

Negotiators included IAM Vice President Roy Brown; James J. Mayer, industrial relations director for Douglas; and J. Curtis Counts, union negotiator.

Special emphasis will be placed on broiler cooking by Mrs. McEwen, she said.

"New cooking methods can give the flavor to certain foods that broiling achieves," she stated. "Although women are aware of this fact, there are many who seldom use the broiler because it's too hard to clean.

"In my work, I find the reason for this attitude is that they have never learned to make it easy to clean.

"Here is the trick: As soon as the steak, chops, bacon or chicken halves have been broiled, remove immediately to hot serving dish. Then remove the drip pan and grid from broiler compartment, drain off fat, set them on counter and at once sprinkle surface of grid with soap flakes and cover over with very wet paper or cloth towel.

"It takes but a minute or two to do this and when dish washing time comes you will find the food particles cleaned to a point that the grid and drip pan wash easily as a china plate."
