Tasty Tamale Loaf Recipe Given by Mrs. Mark Wright

This week's Tamale Loaf recipe is being presented by Mrs. Grace Wright, well-known member of the Torrance school board. She was first selected in 1946 by the Torrance mayor to be one of five on the charter committee to withdraw from the Los Angeles school system and to form a local school district. Elected to the first school board in 1947, she has served ever since.

Mrs. Wright, wife of Mark A. Wright, tooling supervisor at National Supply Company, has lived in Torrance since she was 2 years old and attended Lomita schools and UCLA. She studied education and taught two years. She is the mother of two daughters, both of whom are attending college; Marcia is a junior at USC, and Judy a freshman at Santa Barbara.

In addition to her local school board activities, Mrs. Wright is on the executive board of the Los Angeles County Trustees' Association and a member of the Metropolitan Recreation and Youth Services Council. She is also active in the California Association of School Boards.

TAMALE LOAF

- 1/2 lb. veal, cut in small cubes
- 1/2 lb. pork, cut in small cubes
- Large onion, diced
- 1 cup corn meal
- Pkg. of prepared chili brick
- 2 cans tomato sauce
- Olives, oregano, and cummin seed

Cover meat and onion with water; salt, and cook 1 to 1 1/2 hours. Remove meat from liquid and add corn meal that has been dampened with cold water until it is crumbly. (This will keep your corn meal mixture from being lumpy.) Add more water if necessary. Add chili brick and tomato sauce and stir until smooth. Cut up some of the olives and add the rest whole. Add oregano and cummin to taste. Add meat. Put in casserole and bake at 275 degrees for about an hour. Will serve six generously.
