

Area Scouts See Navy's Top Planes

Modern production facilities for several of the U.S. Navy's latest carrier based aircraft were seen Saturday, April 7, by more than 5000 Scouts and scouting officials of the Centinela and South Bay districts, Los Angeles Council, as Douglas Aircraft opened the doors of its El Segundo Division for a special "Scouting Day".

Registered scouters of the two Los Angeles Council districts began thronging through the gates of the sprawling Douglas plant near Los Angeles International Airport at 9 a.m. to see jet and propeller driven aircraft being produced for the seagoing service. The plant remained open until 3 o'clock.

The Scouts got a close look at the Navy's biggest carrier based bomber, the AD3 twin jet Skywarrior; the Navy's smallest bomber, the midget A4D Skyhawk; the F4D Sky- ray jet interceptor; and the AD5 and AD6 propeller driven Skyraiders. In addition, they visited and talked with both Douglas and Navy test pilots assigned to the division.

The special "Scouting Day" was jointly sponsored by Douglas Aircraft Company's El Segundo division, represented by T. E. Springer, vice president general manager, and the office of Capt. F. D. Pfotenhauser, U.S. Navy Bureau of Aeronautics representative at the plant. Assisting were Kenneth Benfield, district chairman, and Robert Horton, district Scout executive, both of the South Bay district, and Edwin Dean and John Collins, district chairman and district executive, respectively, of the Centinela district.
