Festival to Raise Funds for Latter Day Saints Building

"Polynesian Festival," sponsored by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, will be presented May 5 from 5 to 8 p.m. at 2100 W. 174th St., Gardena.

Highlighting the event will be the appearance of Polynesian natives attired in their native costume and the presentation of their traditional dances, ceremonial songs and rituals.

An authentic village, complete with tropical foods and tribal ceremonies, will accent the affair. Samoan huts and an "umu," an earth-covered pit where the natives will cook traditional foods such as fish, pork and chicken on hot lava coals, will be on display for visitors as they are conducted on guided tours throughout the village. "Poi," a famous tropical dish, will also be served.

For Fund Raising
The project is being sponsored in conjunction with the Royal Samoan Association for the purpose of raising funds for the construction of the

Gardena Ward-Redondo Stake House. Donations of \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for children under 12 will entitle guests to the dinner, tour and viewing of the island dances and ancient ceremonies.

Adding more authenticity to the occasion will be the presentation of the sacred ritual "Kava," a Samoan ceremony revolving around the creation and consumption of a non-toxic drink made from the root of the Samoan "Ava" tree. The ceremony is staged only at special occasions or for visiting dignitaries to the islands.

It will be presented at the "Polynesian Festival" in honor of John C. Elliot, former governor, and Gerald Gottlieb, former attorney general, of American Samoa.

Fresh flower leis, flown from the islands, will be on sale for tourists who wish to go "native" for the occasion. Island handicraft will be another attraction of the village.
