Hall has been riding professionally since he entered the Torrance Rodeo at last year's Community Fair.

First Money
Three weeks following his local debut the Torrance star took first money in the bull riding class at Lancaster. Since that win he has competed in rodeos in California, Arizona, and Nevada.

According to long time followers of the rodeo circuit his quick rise to top standing in tough competition holds pro-

Coy was born in Memphis, Tex., in 1933, and first came to Torrance in 1938. He attended the local elementary school and Torrance High school until he reached the tenth grade. He then moved to Clovis, Calif., where he completed school and returned to Torrance. As a present resident he is employed by the Torrance Brass Foundry.

First Ride
According to Hall, his first riding experience came while staying at his uncle's ranch in Cuyama Valley, Calif., and what he learned there has been developed with the help of other rodeo cowboys.
