Recommendation of Planning Commission that city employ land use investigator referred to city manager for study and a recommendation.

Resolution 2960 authorizing employment agreement with John V. Russell as superintendent of the city's building department approved.

Ordinance 815 setting three-step salary range for city employees adopted as urgency measure.

City Clerk A. H. Bartlett reported the city's share of the Motor Vehicle Lic. apportionment for the period Dec. 1, 1955 through May 31, 1956 was \$322,348.21.

Engineer Jerry Holloman of the Torrance Fire Dept. outlined results of a salary survey he conducted comparing pay of Torrance firemen with that of Burbank, Glendale, Santa Monica, Inglewood and Pasadena. The report was received by the Council for study.

First of a series of reports compiled by the Torrance Fire Fighters Assn. was presented to the Council by Glenn Price, representing that organization.

City Manager Stevens reported in answer to request by Councilman Jahn, that he had received cost estimates of placing light on Torrance Municipal Airport but that he still had to obtain estimates from Edison Co. for supplying power.
