

Plans to Establish Young Republican Club Launched

Plans for establishment of an active Young Republican Club in Torrance were laid last week when city and area Republican leaders met to map out the first organizational meeting of the group scheduled for Wednesday evening, July 18.

The proposed club will be Torrance-wide in scope, encompassing Republicans between the ages of 18 and 36 in all of the new housing developments as well as the central area of the community.

Preliminary plans call for establishment of a year-around political organization designed to offer opportunities to indi-

viduals to serve on community improvement projects as well as participate actively in election campaigns.

To Canvass Area
The July 18 meeting of the new YR Club is slated as a "get-acquainted" session primarily. A meeting place for this event has been selected at 2217 W. 174th St.

Membership in the organization will be open to all eligible and interested young Republicans. Tentative plans for canvassing of all Torrance young men and women were discussed by party leaders with emphasis on the new tracts where a large percentage of residents

fall within the proper age bracket.

Campaign Against Drunk Driving Reduces Harbor Division Crashes

Drunken driving only caused three accidents during the last 18 days of June in Harbor Division, according to police who arrested 87 drunken drivers during June to reduce traffic deaths and injuries.

However, drunken driving continues as a major cause of accidents in the San Pedro-Wilmington area with 15 drunken driving accidents reported during the month. Also reported were 22 hit-and-run accidents.

Encouraged by the reduction in drunken driving accidents during the last half of June, Harbor Division officers will continue to emphasize drunken driving enforcement during July.

Traffic accidents during June produced 128 injuries and one death, bringing the total death toll for 1956 to five. Although Harbor Division has a lower death and injury rate in traffic accidents than other police divisions, seven divisions have established a lower rate of accidents in which injuries were suffered.

Motorists are cautioned to reduce speed to limits posted on streets and highways for greatest driving safety. Also encouraged is more courtesy at intersections where right-of-way violations occur.

Three motor officers have been assigned to late patrol during July to control drunken driving. On Friday and Saturday nights additional motor officers will supplement the three-man patrol. Officers are instructed to enforce all traffic laws with special emphasis on drunken driving.
