Miss McNess said that along with the many points of government she had learned during her stay in Sacramento, her association with the other girls would be a lasting delight. Miss McNess was chosen over other Narbonne High School juniors to spend the week at Sacramento. Miss McNess will return to school in the fall and report to the other students what she learned while at State. The American Legion Auxiliary, Lomita unit, which sponsored her, was pleased to hear Pat say she was very glad to be living in a community which has an organization which has sponsors such a worthwhile program.
