Noted Jurist Plans New Crusade Against Wastes

Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Roger A. Pfaff, nationally prominent for his campaigns against traffic violators and juvenile delinquency, will open a new crusade this week against what he labels, "Our New Tax-Free Privileged Class."

The famed jurist will deliver his first salvo in an address before some 300 members of the Sheriff Adds Intoximeter To Equipment.

Sheriff E. W. Biscailuz today announced that in the near future the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department will introduce the use of the Intoximeter, or more commonly known as the Balloon Test for drunk drivers.

This device has been used successfully in the past and the courts have admitted into evidence the results of this examination when administered by qualified law enforcement officers.

"We are beginning a training class which will be instructed by our Chief Chemist, George Lacy," explained Biscailuz, "and every Deputy assigned to patrol car activity will be qualified to use this device within a short time to augment our efforts in the enforcement of drunk driving laws."

First appointed to the Municipal Court bench in 1947 by Gov. Earl Warren and to the Superior Court by Gov. Goodwin J. Knight in 1955, he currently is serving as head of the Glendale Division of the Superior Court.
