Bly Quanna Tingley



Skip and Ted Faux Save Family From Rocks Off Palos Verdes

While out fishing Sunday morning, Skip and Ted Faux, 111, Calle de Andalucia, became involved in the rescue of four persons thrown into the ocean by a large swell. Skip reports that the victims, he believes that they were husband and wife, and two daughters, had launched their boat at Marineland, headed out to sea, and were capsized about 100 yards off shore. When the Fauxs arrived on the scene, they had been in the water for 25 minutes, clinging to the side of the half submerged boat.

Another boat had been making unsuccessful attempts to make the rescue when the Fauxs cruised into the area. Ted saw that the capsized craft was likely to be tossed onto the nearby rocks and threw his anchor line to them, however the swimming victims were too exhausted to secure the rope. Ted then moved his boat in closer and made a direct pick-up.

Jack Myers, Redondo Beach, followed the Fauxs in, and as their boat was too small to accommodate six adults, took two of the rescued aboard. A tow line was then fastened to the capsized boat and it was brought to shore.

In the excitement of the rescue the Fauxs neglected to get the names of the people picked out of the water. A couple of days later though, Mrs. Faux received a phone call from Fred Wada, of Los Angeles, who identified himself as the man taken from the water.
