

Bluebirds Drop Season Finals

Torrance's Bluebirds bowed out of the Los Angeles Inter-League Championships, and wound up their 1956 season, Sunday afternoon at Manchester Park as they dropped an 11-6 decision to the Los Angeles Coasters.

Torrance took a short lived 3-1 lead in the second inning, but fell behind as the Coasters pounded him for 13 hits on the way to their winning margin.

The Bluebirds came back in the fourth with three more scores to take over by 6-5. The winners came up with one tally to knot the score at six-all.

Five more Los Angeles runs in the sixth frame was the clincher as Torrance was shut out in the last four innings of the seven frames played.

Bob Guile, a new face in the local line-up, swung the heaviest Bluebird bat as he pounded a triple and two doubles in four trips to the plate. The only other Torrance extra-base hit came from Hank Camout, a double in four trips.
