

THE TYRANT

A father of two boys, 8 and 10, told me, "I've been a tyrant. As an accountant I work with figures; they're either wrong or correct—I've expected my boys to add up to perfection. They didn't. My abusive criticism made liars of them. Fear of me created a mental block that seriously affected their school work. One teacher told my wife, "Your son is not mentally equipped to meet our schedule; you should send him to . . . school (an institution for mentally retarded)." I was insane with rage! My son mentally retarded! I'll put her in her place, stormed to the school, read the riot act, told her she was unfit to teach in our schools. She listened and when I ran down she answered me.

"Do you abuse your son as you have scolded me?" she asked. "You are a tyrant worse than Hitler. Your son is a cringing human being," she smiled, and suggested, "Try being tolerant. Make him love you and respect you, not fear you!"

"My legs were jelly as I went home. My head swirled as I realized my error. I followed her suggestions; within six months my son was at the head of his class."
