The expenses of the two official representatives of the district will be defrayed from

It was indicated that the choice of the two top scouts will be made strictly by competitive examinations, to include Scoutcraft, scholastic standing, and athletics, in order to give every qualified scout a chance to prove his right to attend the Jamboree. Plans for the examinations, it was stated, will be drawn up

by a group of Scout fathers to be selected at an early meeting of the Troop Committee.

Milt Huber is Scoutmaster of Troop 753, and Marvin Shockley is Assistant Scoutmaster.

Junior leaders of the Troop, led by Scoutmaster Huber, attended a week-end Junior Leader Training Conference at Cabrillo Beach recently, where they received instruction in Scout training activities. They will devote this knowledge to the training of other Scouts in the troop.
