Armstrong stress in recalling their two months of travel.

"His parents did not speak English but after delicious sauerkraut and pork at their home, one noon and evenings out at true German restaurants, we were soon well enough acquainted to call for warm good-bye hugs.

"Roland had the rest of our stay in Germany meticulously planned. He went with us up the beautiful Rhine, guided us that night to a hotel on the top of the mountain, reached by a ski lift. Such a view of the Rhine from those heights, first a sunset, then a gorgeous sunset, a walk through ferns and pines to our hotel, which was a very old royal hunting began Aug. 5 by air from Los Angeles.

 "On to Switzerland, then Italy, to Nice, and finally to Paris, from where we were going to fly home. Roland surprised us again one morning after he had ridden 13 hours sitting up all night on a third class train so that we could all see each other again.

"We had received a cablegram from our daughter, Mrs. E. B. Hall, that Danielle's parents (Danielle Michellet is an AFS student from France living with Mrs. Hall and family and going to Hollywood High School) were coming from Lyon to Paris to meet us.

"They arrived with a sister and two brothers of Danielle. We saw Paris together, that beautiful city, with space for parks and squares and monuments with proper backgrounds, Arche de Triomphe, Champs de Elysees and dinner in restaurants away from tourists.

TOUR GERMANY
 "For ten days after that we rented a car and with Roland to guide us we went in the little villages, saw the people working in the lush green fields, saw them walking beside their oxen and oxcarts, taking their grain to their barns for the winter, walked in the narrow cobblestone streets, stopped in friendly little grocery shops for cheese, rolls, beer and fruit.

"When we reached the 1000 year old walled town of Rothenburg, we met Hella Fesefeld, another AFS student who had lived at the Tommy Thompson's home in Palos Verdes Estates. She had traveled many hours on a bus to meet us there. It seemed like a real family reunion as we sat, the six of us, at a comfortable round table in the quaint old hotel. The hotel clerks were very curious and ask with apologies, "What kind of a family this was, a family, but all with different names!"

"Hella stayed with us for the night and was eager for all the news of Palos Verdes. Our stepping on the starter of our car was preceded by clinging farewells. We had to leave before her bus was due.

"It was difficult to part with Roland at Wiesbaden. We had had many talks, discussing his

plans for the future: teaching vs. business, and learned about the extensive work he has done in his part of Germany for the AFS, helping to get homes for our summer students, helping choose the very best German representatives to come to the United States. As president of his class, he said he was finally able to introduce many democratic methods in student management.

Angelos to Toronto. In Toronto they sailed with their grandsons "E. B." and Peter Hall, 346 S. Ardmore, Los Angeles, for Liverpool and a motor trip through the British Isles. Their itinerary then took them to Holland, Switzerland, Germany, Italy, the French Riviera and to Paris where they boarded a plane for the return trip to New York and finally to Los Angeles, arriving home Oct. 5.

Mrs. Armstrong, wife of a prominent Torrance attorney and civic leader, tells the story in her own words:

"After motoring through England and Scotland, not missing a castle, a dungeon or the Scottish "mist"—we were on to Holland, then to Bremen, Germany's port.

"There Rose Marie Zirpel met us. She bicycled through wooded areas to our hotel; rain coat, pink cheeks, blue eyes and bursting with enthusiasm. (She had stayed at our home in PVE for 3 weeks in 1955).

"Rose Marie Zirpel was an exchange student to the East Coast of the United States in 1951. She was brought back here in 1955 to let the local AFS know what the "returnees" do to keep together, to keep informed and to further good will and understanding."

BREMEN WELCOME
 "When the summer students, 700 or more arrive from the United States to stay in European homes for three months, and when the European students return after their year in the United States (800 now) she arranges for their welcome and a three-day stay in Bremen. She even arranged for Bremen officials to finance this huge undertaking. All the AFS students who go to and from Europe know Rose Marie.

"As she is now teaching, having graduated from college she took our 12-year-old twin grandsons to visit her fifth grade class. They came home with reports of the friendliness of the German children. They assisted Rose Marie in teaching the children their English lesson that morning and come home with an English-German primer, along


MICHIGAN GUEST
