Dorsey, who recently returned from a series of traffic consultations in Australia, will speak on the most vital parking situation in the Torrance downtown area.

The former city of Los Angeles traffic engineer is now a resident of Manhattan Beach and has been retained by many Southland cities to solve the complex parking problems that face cities today. At the present time he is completing a survey of parking in Torrance and has already presented many of his recommendations to the City Council.

Co-chairmen Don Armstrong and Paul Roettger of the membership breakfast further stated that Dorsey will be available for a question and answer period following his presentation Tuesday morning.

Hundreds Join Harbor Area Chest Drive

Hundreds of volunteer workers are conducting an all-out campaign in the harbor area to help meet the Los Angeles Area Community Chest goal of \$10 million for its 168 Red Feather health, welfare and service agencies.

Volunteers in soliciting gifts to the Chest are seeking "A Bigger Yes to Community Chest," asking a dollar more from 750,000 givers, to meet the \$800,000 increase over last year's campaign goal of \$9,250,000. Harbor area goal is \$65,946.

During the past 12 months residents of Torrance, Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills, and Lomita have been recipients of services offered by the Chest agencies.

More than 700 youngsters were given treatment at children's hospitals and clinics; 21 adults were also treated at clinics; 125 persons received Visiting Nurse care, and 302 persons received help with family and personal problems. Specialized personal services were given 90 persons; 13 dependent and neglected children received care, and foster care, adoptions and protective services were rendered 49 children.

More than 5000 youths were served in recreation and youth services, and 10,710 servicemen and veterans were aided by the area Veterans Service Center.

Due to the high cost of securing a break-down, community by community, total of people served by PTA, Salvation Army and Travelers Aid in the whole Chest area was 73,589.

State President Addresses Area Music Teachers

The thriving South Bay Branch of the California State Music Teachers Assn. met Nov. 4, Mrs. Viola Niland serving as hostess.

Members attending were honored with the presence of two distinguished guests, State President Helen Adele Daum and the famous composer, Dr. Elliot Griffis.

A brief business session was presided over by Branch President Gertrude Lumsden, which was followed by an inspiring talk given by State President Daum, concerning several amendments and revisions of the state laws, the certificate of merit award program; the California plan, and other topics of interest to the professional music teacher.

Lilas Stefan, vice president and program chairman, then introduced Dr. Elliot Griffis, internationally known composer, who for the next hour thrilled his audience with a discussion and performance of many of his innumerable compositions, which include symphonies, orchestral suites and symphonic poems, string quartets and trios, and countless delightful songs and piano pieces.

Dr. Griffis was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in 1931 for his "String Quartet." He received his doctorate in music from the New York College of Music in 1937.




