"The goal of teaching can be accomplished only if teachers have faith in the essential goodness of man."

**Routes for Jamboree Trip Revealed by Scout Office**

A tour of the nation, historic shrines and adventure will be a part of the Los Angeles Area Council's tour of the National Boy Scout Jamboree next July.

The special train made up of 13 Pullman cars, baggage and lounge cars will take 518 boys and 54 leaders on a trip of a lifetime covering 6800 miles between July 3 and 25.

Eastbound stops include Salt Lake City, Yellowstone Park, Chicago, Niagara Falls, New York City; then a week at Valley Forge for the National Jamboree which is expected to draw 50,000 boys from all over the free world.

En route home the train will make sightseeing stops at Washington, D.C., Gettysburg, Harrisburg, Kansas City, Boulder City, and on back to the starting point of East Los Angeles.

**Troops Formed**  
Fourteen troops have been formed, and the boys are currently spending week ends in camp with their leaders to perfect their camping skills and master Jamboree cookery.

Total cost for the trip averages out to 6 1/2 cents a mile - \$436 per boy, which includes all meals, transportation, Jamboree fees and sightseeing tours.

The National Jamboree at Valley Forge July 12-18 will provide one of the greatest inspirational and maturing experiences in the lives of the boys attending, the actual trip to and from the Atlantic Coast will be as important as the Jamboree itself.

First stop on the Grand Tour will be Salt Lake City, a bus tour of the city, a visit to Saltair, giant recreation beach, for a never-to-be-forgot-

ten swim in the Great Salt Lake, then an organ recital at the Mormon Tabernacle, followed by a picnic.

**To Tour Park**  
Next morning the group arrives at West Yellowstone in time to have breakfast at Yellowstone Lodge before a 100-mile tour of the national park, visiting all of the principal geysers, "Old Faithful," the falls, bears, elk herds, and back to the lodge for dinner.

Those are sample days that will be awaiting Scouts and Explorers from Los Angeles as they make a giant sweeping circle of the nation.

**Yacht Trip Slated**  
There will be a 24-hour stay in New York City, stopping at the Governor Clinton Hotel, and a tour around Manhattan in a chartered yacht before leaving for Jamboree town, a complete city.

Finally the Los Angeles contingent will start home, with a day in Washington, D.C., a boat trip to Mt. Vernon, a visit to pay their respects at Arlington and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

After this stop it's on to Harrisburg, a swim in the historic Susquehanna, and a bus tour of Gettysburg battlefields. Next on to St. Louis, Kansas City, Denver, the Royal Gorge and Hoover Dam before returning home early on the morning of July 25.

No dream trip this... but one for any Scout or Explorer in the Los Angeles Area Council, and there are 35 open reservations at this time. Trip berths will be assigned on a first come basis. Torrance area Scouts can make reservations by calling Dr. Allen E. Hofferber during the week at FA 8-3664.
