3. All exhibits must be in place by noon on Friday, May 17. Exhibits may be arranged Thursday evening, May 16. Exhibits may not be removed until 9 p.m. Sunday.
4. We will not be responsible for loss or damage to any article or materials used in exhibits.
5. Exhibitors' names will not be allowed on exhibits until after the judging.
6. Judging will begin promptly at 1 p.m. on Friday, May 17. No one, other than the judges and committee members, will be allowed in the auditorium during the judging. All decisions of the judges will be final.
