Mammoth Three Day Exhibition Gets Underway Friday Evening

Tomorrow evening at 6 o'clock the doors at the Torrance Civic Auditorium will be open to the public for the annual Flower, Arts, Hobby and Aquarium Show. The three-day event is being sponsored by the Torrance Terrace Garden Club, North Torrance Fuchsia Society, Torrance Recreation Department, and the Harbor Aquarium Society. Hours for the show, for which there is no admission charge, will be: Friday from 6 until 9 p.m.; Saturday from noon until 9 p.m. and Sunday from noon until 9 p.m. On display will be the choice plants and flowers of the area, an exhibit of fine paintings, ceramics, weavings, and other hobbies, and an exceptional showing of aquariums filled with tropical fish.

Among the many exhibits will be a display of handcraft made by patients at Harbor General Hospital as well as other handcraft by children and adults. There will be plane models and other models and there will be collections of many kinds. The art display will show the work of some of the budding young artists of the area as well as examples of the work of many talented adults. Needlework displays

will have bedspreads and table scarves, pictures made in thread, as well as crocheting, knitting, and other needlework. There will be a leathercraft display and flower arrangements of wood fibre and other materials. Ceramics will be found on exhibit as well as examples of the culinary art.

The Fourth Annual Aquarium Show of the Harbor Aquarium Society will be one of the largest displays of home aquariums to be seen in this area. There will be over 30 entries in the show and among them will be aquariums containing specimens of all of the well known freshwater tropical fish as well as some large aquariums containing some of the very rare and beautiful salt water tropicals that are

seldom seen except in pictures. There will be large tanks and small ones, elaborate aquariums and simple ones. The club show tank will contain some of life ever popular angel fish. Club members will be present to answer any questions about the aquarium display.

The Flower Show will have on display, many arrangements of flowers of all kinds and of every variety. There will be floor displays of garden spots to enjoy, as well as potted plants and desert cactus. There will be arrangements of children of flowers and plants as well as ideas for the house and garden. Door prizes will be awarded each day on the hour and a grand door prize on Sunday evening.

Entries are still being taken in all divisions. For entry in the Hobby and Arts division, call Bertha Hutchinson or Irene Harris. For Flower Show entries, call Mrs. George Powell, Mrs. Victor Benstead or Mrs. George Rowley. All displays must be in place by noon on Friday, May 17. Judging will begin at 1 p.m. Awards will be made in all divisions and sections of the show.

Club Hostess


