Guard Engineers Study Demolition, Explosives

In addition to being experts in bridge construction, Army engineers are proficient in a large category of assignments, it was demonstrated here recently by members of Company E, 132nd Armored Engineering Battalion.

Fourteen members of the unit recently completed technical classes on explosives and demolitions, according to the unit's public information officer, Nap Bilodeau.

Explaining that the engineers are accustomed to fighting side by side with the infantry, Bilodeau said their new knowledge of explosives and demolition will make them even more valuable to the fighting units.

Techniques in using demolitions and explosives for mine fields and to destroy large enemy concentrations were demonstrated by M/Sgt. Bill Lyons, an expert in the field.
