equipment and the maintaining of the desired fluoride level would be too difficult for the average employee of a water company. No such problems have arisen where the method has been employed, for the procedure is similar in nature to the treatment of water supplies which is now in universal use.

## Courts Uphold

As for the legality of community fluoridation, the courts of 13 states where fluoridation was contested have upheld it as a valid community activity involving no infringement on personal liberty.

Certainly any procedure which offers improved health as well as improved appearance for future citizens, so safely and at so low a cost, deserves the support of the forward-looking members of every community.

Moving up to the vacated division tubular manager's job is John R. Mefford, sales representative in Los Angeles.


Appointment Made

## Handy Jim's Fix-Ups for the Home

Children Play Darts on Marlite Wainscot  
In a child's room, the lower wall area or wainscot is subject to a considerable beating which necessitates frequent redecorating. On the market is a wall material which is ideally suited for the wainscot. Known as Marlite, a



decorated hardboard with a plastic surface, these panels never need redecorating.

Those shown are planks 16" wide. They are easy to put up, as they have tongue and groove edges and metal clips which enable even an amateur craftsman to put them up accurately. These particular planks have a wood-grain finish. Others come in pastel colors.

So durable are these planks, youngsters can play a target game drawn on them with a wax crayon. They use suction-cupped darts. Marks like the ones made for the target are removed with a damp cloth. The durable material under the plastic finish is time-tried Masonite Plywood.

Of course, the wainscot may be full-width, 4' panels of Marlite. Recommended for the upper walls and ceiling are blocks, 16" square, which come in the same variety of patterns and shades as the planks. All are available at lumber yards.

## Relocation Agreed Upon

Approval of an agreement for the relocation of water mains, owned by the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power, along Normandie Ave., south of Artesia Blvd., to hasten construction of Dominguez Channel, was announced by Supervisor Kenneth Hahn.

Under terms of the agreement, the Department of Water and Power will relocate the water mains and the County Flood Control District will pay the cost of the work.


Supervisor Hahn explained that it was necessary to relocate the water lines because of the \$2,000,000 in improve-

ments being made to Dominguez Channel between Denker and Vermont Aves., on which preliminary construction began recently.

The flood control channel is being built on a new alignment south of Artesia. It will have concrete side and bottom.

New bridges will be built over the channel's new course at Normandie and Vermont Aves., Hahn stated.

This project also calls for the slough areas along the channel between Western and Vermont to be filled in with the excess earth from excavating the new channel.
