

Chamber to Discuss City Park Report

Torrance Chamber of Commerce members will hear Robert Gold of Kroeger and Associates discuss the controversial park survey at the monthly membership breakfast June 18, 7:30 a.m. at the YWCA, Carson at Plaza Del Amo.

Gold will report on the survey made by his firm on recreation and park facilities in this city, according to Chairman Milton Hunter and Jack Phillips.

Preliminary reports indicate that a bond issue of some \$5,000,000 might be asked when the report is completely re-examined by the City Recreation Commission headed by Herma Tillim.

Some official city sources already have termed the report as "inaccurate."

A record turn-out is expected to be on hand to hear Gold and ask questions on the subject.


