Supervisors to Hear Residents Of Rolling Hills

Residents of the proposed City of Rolling Hills Estates have until Tuesday to submit written statements requesting to be left in or excluded from the incorporation drive. Protests should be filed with the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors. Supervisors postponed a decision on the city boundaries last week when some 75 persons appeared with petitions asking to be removed from the proposed city.

Corporation Object
Requests for exclusion also were made by Palos Verdes Properties Inc., and Great Lakes Carbon Co. officials who said their firms preferred to stay in the county.

A decision, setting the city limits, is expected to be made June 18.

The proposed city would cover surrounding unincorporated area bounded by the cities of Palos Verdes Estates and Torrance on the north; Palos Verdes Dr. North Via Canada and Crest Rd. on the east and Silver Spur Rd. and Crenshaw Blvd. on the west.

Name Confused
Supervisors last week also heard the mayor of the City of Rolling Hills object to the name "City of Rolling Hills Estates," when he declared there would be endless confusion between the two cities.

However, the Deputy County Counsel, John Maharg, gave his informal opinion that the supervisors could not interfere.

Study Shows State Cancer Deaths 78% Higher Among Smokers

Statistics covering the participation of 12,390 California men in the American Cancer Society's study of the relation between smoking and cancer of the lung were released by the California division of the society.

More than 3000 men in Los Angeles County were included in the study.

Between January, 1952, and October, 1955, 456 of the California men died. Of these deaths, 324 occurred among men with a history of regular cigarette smoking. If their age specific death rate had been the same as those for the California men who never smoked regularly, only 188 of these cigarette smokers would have died.

Rate Is Higher
Thus the death rate of the California cigarette smokers was 72 per cent higher than the

death rate of the California men who never smoked regularly, age being taken into consideration. For the over-all total, the comparable figure was 54 per cent.

Men who said that they were smoking a pack of cigarettes a day or more in 1952 accounted for 104 of the California deaths. Only 47 of the pack-or-more-a-day cigarette smokers would have died between January, 1952, and October, 1955, if their age specific death rate had been the same as the California men who never smoked regularly.

Figures Told
Thus the death rate of the California pack-or-more-a-day cigarette smokers was 121 per cent higher than the death rate of the California men who never smoked regularly, age being taken into consideration. In the total study the compar-

able figure was 88 per cent. Nineteen of the California men died of lung cancer. All 19 smoked.

The percentage of deaths among male smokers in the California portion of the study ran somewhat higher than for the national as a whole. American Cancer Society statisticians attached no significance to this. They said that findings varied in each of the nine states in which samplings were made, but that the variations from state to state were well within the limit of chance, considering the number of cases on which the percentages were based.

Volunteers Help
American Cancer Society volunteers in ten California counties helped conduct the national survey which began with the following number of case histories in each county: Fresno - 1025; Kern - 1296; Los Angeles - 3409; Martin - 770; Sacramento - 1093; San Francisco - 1530; San Joaquin - 1814; San Mateo - 981; Santa Barbara - 65; Sonoma - 407.

The portion of the smoking study carried out in California covered a total of 29,140 man years, i.e., the number of men multiplied by the number of years each man was traced over the 44-month period of the survey.

Results of the national study were reported at the annual meeting of the American Medical Association in New York on June 4, by Dr. E. Cyler Hammond and Dr. Daniel Horn, director and assistant director respectively of American Cancer Society statistical research.
