

## Nuclear reactors designed and built by Atomics International are putting the peaceful atom to work around the world

Right here in the San Fernando Valley—at Canoga Park and in the nearby Santa Susana Mountains—Atomics International has created one of the world's most famous centers in the development of nuclear reactors for the new Atomic Age.



For America's Defense, the NAVAHO intercontinental strategic guided missile has been brought to an advanced stage by the highly successful supersonic flights of X-10 Test Missiles like the one shown above. Controlled throughout its flight by a self-contained guidance system, the NAVAHO meets the Strategic Air Command's most rigid requirements for range, immunity to interception, pinpoint accuracy, and destructive power. The Missile Development Division, Downey, is building the NAVAHO.
