Deep sea anglers seem anxious to chase down the elusive chicken of the sea regardless of the long boat ride involved. Most local fishing landings are running at least one albacore special daily, con-

necting with long-fins after more than a six hour paunt. Pacific Sportfishing Landing reported the Fisherman and Fisherman 2, both on albacore runs Saturday and Sunday accounted for 55. Joe Martens long-fin special Monday had 18 decked.

The Horseshoe Kelp sprung back to life Monday after three dead days with three of Martens' crafts wracking up a total of 302 log barracuda, 132 yellowtail and one 15 pound bluefin tuna, first for the season horsed aboard by a gal, but not! Weekly winner in the landings deep sea fishing derby was won by Louis Mayer of Monrovia, fir his 32 pound 1 ounce yellow.

San Diego fishing fleet continues to send only a couple of their boats for albacore off north island of the Coronados, while the rest concentrate on scrappy yellowtail. According to Al Coast, who with brothers Abe and Keith, aboard the Kiara Sunday, long-fins are all over the area. Only trouble is the shortage of anchovies. Plenty of cardines, much to the liking of yellowtail. But anchovies are practically being rationed. Skipper of the Kiara, Andy Anderson, pulled a sharp. Saved the bait from Saturday, so along with his limited amount Sunday, had plenty for albacore. Forty passengers hauled aboard 78 long-fins. Topper brought to gaff hit 30 pounds, 3 ounces. Al sacked his limit with a lunker pushing 27 1/2 pounds. Abe followed with a sack of seven and Keith three.

Clyde Bottrell brought back another truck load of fish Sunday from Anacapa Island: 330 pounds of it to be exact, all rolled into one giant black sea bass. Chic Hill, after several trips to the black sea bass hole, finally made it all worth while — decked his first, a few pounds shy of 200 pounds. Just have to keep after them and eventually it pay off.
