### Council to Hear Plans for Pipe Line Installation

Four Corners Pipe Line Co. of Houston, Texas, Tuesday will request a blanket franchise to install at 16-inch pipe line capable of transporting 160,000 barrels of crude oil daily through Torrance.

City councilmen will act on the request at the regular meeting of the city's governing body.

**Four Corners Area**

The line would transport oil from points in the so-called Four Corners Area (producing oil and gas fields in southwestern Colorado, northeastern Arizona, southeastern Utah and northwestern New Mexico).

Tentative route for the proposed pipe line in Torrance has been surveyed and commences in the GP refinery on the west side of Crenshaw Blvd., 150 feet north of Del Amo Blvd.; continuing south on Crenshaw to the Union Oil Lomita Tank Farm at Lomita Blvd.

The franchise is requested for a term of 40 years.

**Pay Ordinance**

In other action, the council will hear an emergency ordinance continuing a three-step pay range plan for city employees and making a change in the salaries of positions in the classified section.

Added to the classification plan and salary schedule are 13 new positions including an administrative assistant and a finance officer for the city.
