Try A Barbecue... It's
 Fun For the Whole Family

 If the hot, sticky summery days will your appetite — try eating and cooking the evening meal out in the patio.

Patio dinners are becoming THE THING in social circles throughout the Southern California area.

And many Torrance families are discovering that appetites are heartier and outdoor cooking is fun for the entire family.

There's no limitation as to what can be cooked on the patio barbecue grill: be it steak, hot dogs, fish, baked potatoes, ears of corn.

If there is no built-in barbecue grill — don't be dismayed. A portable grill can be purchased economically and provides the same kind of a charcoal fire.

For a different kind of a menu, Mrs. Allan Pyeatt, 3226 Onrado St., suggests a dinner consisting of barbecued spare ribs, baked beans and a green salad.

Recipe for the ribs and sauce — both of which can be cooked at the same time on a barbecue grill — has been given by Mrs. Pyeatt.

BARBECUED SPARE RIBS
 Use 2 lbs. lean spare ribs (serves four).

Rub ribs with soy sauce, a drop of liquid smoke, garlic powder, and dry mustard. Allow ribs to set for 30 minutes in room temperature.

Place the ribs over low coals on the grill and cook for one hour.

When the ribs are two-thirds done, mix oregano, sweet basil and paprika together and sprinkle the mixture on the ribs.

BARBECUE SAUCE
 In a sauce pan, which can set on the grill, place:

- 1 cup of water
 - 1/2 cup of chili sauce
 - dash of tabasco
 - 1 tsp. celery seed
 - pinch of oregano, sweet basil and paprika
 - 1 drop of liquid smoke.
- Simmer while the ribs are cooking and then add 1/4 cup of California sherry just before serving time.

The ribs should be served and then the sauce poured over them.

Mrs. Pyeatt also suggests her favorite recipe for roquefort dressing to be poured over romaine lettuce.

ROQUEFORT DRESSING
 1/2 lb. of blue cheese
 1/2 cup cottage cheese
 1 tablespoon sour cream
 Mash these ingredients together and add:

- 1/2 cup buttermilk
 - 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
 - pinch of garlic powder
 - 1 cup of salad dressing (mayonnaise)
- Mix together and add:
