**No License Costs Pilot \$800 Fine**

Flying without a pilot certificate will cost Ernest J. Peters of Torrance more than \$800.

The judgement against Peters was awarded to the United States by Federal Judge Ben Harrison in Los Angeles July 8.

Peters, whose student pilot certificate expired two years ago, was caught by a Civil Aeronautics Administration inspector when Peters and a passenger landed a borrowed Piper aircraft at Torrance after making a local flight.




