A Torrance woman never has to wonder much about what she'll give friends and relatives for presents.

She makes all her own gifts — and wholeheartedly recommends her hobby to women of all ages.

Mrs. William Latto, 3211 W. 187th St., does ceramic work — a hobby which is becoming more and more popular.

Reasons for the popularity surge, according to Mrs. Latto is that it is an inexpensive hobby; the person doesn't have to be artistically talented to make beautiful things; and gone are the worries about what to give as presents.

Mrs. Latto started her hobby when she attended a Torrance Adult Education class in ceramics. She liked the work so well, she went into business for herself but now she confines her work to teaching ceramic work in her home.

Basic tools cost about \$2, she says. Then the person chooses what she wants to make from a large selection of greenware — the unfinished product found in all-ceramic stores.

After the rough greenware is smoothed out, the rough edges taken off, then begins the work of painting. After the painting, which includes designs drawn free-hand or by tracing, the item then is put into a kiln, (an oven especially constructed for firing).

When the clay work has been fired, a coat of glaze is put on to protect the color and then another firing is given.

Finished objects around Mrs. Latto's house include Japanese lamps, plaques, ash trays, dolls, planters, plates, cups and saucers.

"One of the best things about ceramic work, is that you can make individual gifts," she said. She exhibited some of the Santa Claus cups she made last Christmas, each with a name painted on it.

Baby announcement cards were preserved on wall plaques as well as wedding bells with the couples' names inscribed.

Many of the ceramic pieces can be made for about 50 per cent of the price, charged by stores for the finished work, according to Mrs. Latto.

Most people who do this work as a hobby do not own their own kilns, and have the firing done by professionals. The cost of the firing is nominal and kilns cost from \$6 to \$100.

All in all, Mrs. Latto maintains there is great satisfaction in this do-it-yourself hobby.


