



BE TRIM, GRACEFUL AND CREATIVE . . . All this is being offered to children and older dancers of Torrance this summer in daily classes at the Civic Auditorium under the direction of Miss Mickey Van Deventer who is able to offer the new slants on modern dances brought by her from her studies at the Perry-Mansfield School of Theatre Arts and Dance in Colorado. This series of classes, in which creative abilities, techniques, dance composition, music, and make-up are studied is sponsored by the Torrance Recreation Dept.

The Modern Dance — Offered On Recreation Dept. Summer Schedule

New slants on modern dance are being offered to children as well as adults of Torrance by the local recreation department this summer. These classes, held daily at the Civic auditorium, are being presented by Mickey Van Deventer who attended the Perry-Mansfield school of Theatre Arts and Dance in Steamboat Springs, Colorado. Mickey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grover C. Van Deventer, was graduated this spring from Redlands University and will teach in the High and Junior High school in Barstow next fall, where she will have charge of the choral music.

In these classes, held in two sessions, from July 8 to July 26 and from July 29 to Aug. 23, the dancers are taught the techniques and modern dance studies. The beginners class, for students from 7 to 13 years of age, is geared to help children learn grace of movement, arouse their sense of rhythm and stimulate their creative abilities. Interesting story records are one of the sources

that are used to stimulate creative dance activity later on in the program.

Classes for beginners, ages 14 to 18, are being held from 2 to 2:45 p.m. and will also consist of technique and modern dance studies. This is a good class in which to keep trim, learn grace of movement, and gain a better knowledge and understanding of modern dance.

Classes for advanced students, ages 7 to 18 are held from 3 until 3:45. Modern dance techniques and studies

will be practiced here and the class will also touch on dance composition, music, make-up and costuming.

Three shows are scheduled for modern dancers this summer, according to Miss Van Deventer. The first scheduled show is the "Aquaade" set for July 26. Talent for these productions will be drawn primarily from this class.


ROYAL NEIGHBOR PARTY JULY 23
