10 Per Cent of Persons Bitten By Rabid Animals Get Disease

 Rabies is always a fatal disease in man, but it is not the inevitable result that follows the bite of a rabid animal as is sometimes thought.

Statistical studies indicate that only about 10 per cent of all persons bitten by rabid animals develop the disease. This is reduced to approximately one per cent when persons receive protection with rabies vaccine (Pasteur treatment) following the bite of an animal ill with the infection.

It is also known that a bite on the foot or leg by a rabid animal is far less likely to produce rabies than one that occurs on the face, upper arms, or on the upper part of the body.

The disease, caused by a filterable virus, affects the nervous system and has been common in America since the early 18th century. The virus is powerful unless it enters the body through a wound or skin abrasion. Infection cannot occur through the unbroken skin.

Although the dog is the most important source of human rabies, all mammals are subject to the disease. Just a few days ago, for instance, a youngster was bitten by a rabid skunk while on a camping trip, and it is presently in the news that the health officer of a North Carolina town has quarantined the entire cat population because a kitten developed the disease. And, in recent years, more than one person has been infected through the bite of a rabid bat.

Pets Brought In
 Even if all the dogs living in Los Angeles County were protected from the disease by vaccination, as they certainly should be, it would not eliminate rabies from this area. Thousands of newcomers and

tourists bring their pets with them, and this makes its next to impossible to maintain 100 per cent canine vaccination against rabies.

Moreover, and perhaps more important, there is always a reservoir of infection among the wild life which, of course, means that cats, rats, gophers, and other small animals may be infected. This is particularly true in the vicinity of arroyos, where it is not an uncommon sight to see a skunk or some other small wild animal on its nightly prowls in built-up residential areas.

Personality Change
 One of the signs of rabies during the early stages of infection may be a decided change in the animal's personality. Any wild animal that comes near a human being is certainly not acting normally and should be avoided. It is also a good idea for parents to warn their children against touching such an animal. If it can be touched, it is definitely sick. If the animal doesn't have rabies, chances are good that it has some other disease that is transmissible to man.

In case a person is bitten by any animal, whether wild or domestic, every effort ought to be made to capture it so that it may be examined and held for observation. If the animal shows no sign of illness during a 15-day quarantine period, the administration of Pasteur treatment to the individual is considered unnecessary.

Very few dogs run amuck and froth at the mouth when rabies develops. In another form of the disease, called dumb rabies, the animal victims tend to be sluggish, crave affection, and often seem to be paralyzed in some parts of the body, particularly the lower jaw which hangs open as though the animal had a bone lodged in its throat. If any person who tries to help the animal has a scratch on his skin, he runs the risk of getting the disease since the virus is in the dog's saliva.
