Groundbreaking Held Yesterday For Coleman Co.


Groundbreaking ceremonies for the two ultra-modern Coleman Engineering Co., Inc., buildings in Torrance were held at 10:30 a.m. yesterday at the corner of Madrona Ave. and Torrance Blvd. Mayor Albert Isen and Torrance Chamber of Commerce President A. E. Thompson assisted T. C. Coleman, president, and other Coleman executives and Sharon Starns, "Miss Torrance" in the official ceremonies.

Estimated to cost \$700,000, the two structures, containing a total of 50,000 square feet have been designed by the William J. Moran Co. to house the Coleman Company's specialized research and development work on military test facilities, industrial and military instrumentation and electronics.


Officials of the Moran Co., who will handle construction stated a 30,000 square-foot administration building will house engineering and administration offices and test laboratories while a 20,000 square foot production building will handle the company's production facilities.

Chamber of Commerce officials predict that Coleman is the first of an expected long list of top research companies that has chosen Torrance for location.

Former Hungary Finance Minister To Speak Friday

"Peace, Justice or Both" will be the subject of an address to be given by Dr. Nicholas Nyaradi, last non-Communist Minister of Finance of Hungary, in the meeting hall of El Retiro Park, Friday, 8 p.m., under the auspices of Republicans Unlimited.

Dr. Nyaradi, born and educated in Hungary, but now an American citizen and director of the Institute of International Studies at Bradley University, was a lawyer and executive director at one of the largest banks in Hungary.

In Underground

Having actively participated in the anti-Nazi underground movement in Hungary during the war, he was asked by the anti-Communist Small Landholders' Party to accept a position in Hungary's post-war coalition government. He represented the Small Landholders' Party as Minister of Finance until 1948 when, as a consequence of the increasing Soviet pressure, he and his wife fled their native country.

Dr. Nyaradi has a unique and profound knowledge of the Soviet Union as he spent months in Moscow negotiating a Russian reparation claim against Hungary and through these conferences came to know many of the Soviet Politburo members.

Guard Leaves for Camp Roberts Field Training

In the early pre-dawn hours the local National Guard unit this morning left Torrance for Camp Roberts, to begin their annual two weeks of summer training.

All the men and light vehicles left under the direction of Capt. Douglas Horlander, commander, with Lt. Robert Brown, company executive officer to leave tomorrow morning at 5 a.m. with the heavy equipment convoy.

Training Set

The unit, part of the 40th Armored Division, will undergo two weeks of the most rigorous army training devised. Company E, known as Bridge Company of that division, and as engineers, their training will consist of many subjects of army engineering, such as carpentry, mine fields, demolitions, bridge building, camouflage, rigging, tactics, heavy equipment operation, water purification, and many other engineering subjects.

This will be the third year for the 61 officers and enlisted men to attend summer camp. Two years ago the local mayor was involved in the capture of an entire company of "enemy" troops, while being accidentally "killed" with Capt. Horlander and a patrol from his company.

Last year the local unit made national headlines when returning from summer camp witnessed a flying saucer or UFO at close range. Over 13 men from the unit testified along with their commanding officer of seeing this unknown in a clear California sky.

The unit is self sufficient in that it maintains its own housing section.


