The group has lined up support from local teenagers and local business leaders and are currently investigating ways by which the center could be obtained.

Meeting Planned They are planning a meeting Tuesday at 2 p.m. of interested teenagers to study the situation. The meeting will be held at Miss Johnson's house. Dick Fitzgerald, president of the Torrance Coordinating Council, has appointed Mrs. Herma Tillim, who has been active in promoting recreation for youngsters, as coordinator to meet with the students to see what plans could be drawn up.

Mrs. Tillim, a former chairman of the Torrance Recreation Commission, pledged her support to aid the drive. Plans are being made to have representatives from all high schools in this area at the Tuesday meeting.

Center Sought What the group has in mind is a place where they could play records, dance and in general, do the things that the younger set like to do for good clean fun.

"People wonder why there is so much juvenile delinquency," Miss Johnson declared. "Well, their answer is that there is no recreation for us. On the week end, there are only a few places to go for fun and recreation—going skating, going to the show, or going to some drive-in. No one likes to do that all the time."

They presented a petition with more than 100 names of fellow teenagers who also would like a center.


Former Accent President Paul Harestad will appear in "The Happy Time" as grand-uncle. Other cast members include Richard French, Bibi,

## Summer Schoolers Enjoy Readin', Writin', 'Rithmetic

Readin', writin', 'n' 'rithmetic proved the most popular features of summer school activities, according to a survey taken by school officials.

In a report given to the Board of Education, the survey indicated that half of the students said they enjoyed summer school most because of the studies and work on basic skills. About a fifth of students said they enjoyed art, music, and crafts best of all.

Other Favorites A small percentage of the students said they liked various parts of the program, in this order: physical education, whole program, teacher, educational films, materials, and being with friends.

On the whole, officials concluded, the students seemed to enjoy the educational part of the program.

At the start of the sessions, 3290 elementary and 573 high school. Of these, 2409 elementary and 437 high school students completed the summer period. Officials said this is normal, since summer school attendance is strictly voluntary.

Suggestions Eyed For next year, pushing back the hours of attendance is under study. Some students suggested that the 8 a.m. start of school be moved up to 8:30 or 9 a.m. Children generally stay up later during the summer months.

Another suggestion under study is that the four-hour kindergarten sessions be shortened to three hours. Youngsters get wiggly if classes are too long, officials reported.

Kindergarten classes generally ran from 8 to 12, while upper grade sessions were from 8 to 12:30.

## High School Registration Slated Aug. 28 to Sept. 4

Registration for new high school students in the Torrance Unified School District will be conducted Aug. 28, 29, 30 and Sept. 3 and 4, between 9 a.m. and noon and from 1 to 3 p.m.

New students at Torrance High School, 2200 Carson St., and North High School, 3620 W. 182nd St., will report to the counseling offices in the main buildings of each school.

Enrollment of new South High School students will be conducted in Room 5 of the Torrance Elementary School, 2005 Martina Ave.

Parents who may need further assistance in determining the correct school of attendance for their child may telephone the Special Services Department of the Torrance Unified Schools.

Freshmen Meet Detailed information concerning the opening of school will be mailed soon to freshmen students, and special orientation meetings will be held for incoming 9th graders as follows:

South High School - Sept. 11 - 9 a.m. Torrance High School Auditorium.  
Torrance High School - Sept. 11 - 1 p.m. Torrance High School Auditorium.  
North High School - Sept. 11 - 1 p.m. North High School Gymnasium.

High school students who attended an elementary school or a high school in Torrance last year will not need to register since their enrollment was completed in June, 1957.

To assist new Torrance residents in determining the high schools serving their area, the following information is submitted concerning the attendance zones of each of the Torrance high schools:

Zones Told North High School: All students in grades 9 through 12 who live north of 190th St. or west of Hawthorne Ave. and north of Del Amo.

All students who will be 11th graders in September, 1957, and who live in the Anza, Hillside, Meadow Park, Newton, Parkway, Riviera, Seaside, Sepulveda, and Waleria elementary school areas.

All students who will be 12th graders in September, 1957, and who live in the Medaow Park area north of Sepulveda Blvd. or in the Anza or Sepulveda elementary school attendance areas.

South High School: All students who will be 9th and 10th graders in September, 1957, and who live in the Anza, Hillside, Meadow Park, Newton, Parkway, Riviera, Seaside, Sepulveda, and Waleria elementary school areas.
