**Daily Phone Use Up 400 Per Cent Here Since 1947**

Exploding Torrance telephone gains in the past 10 years were revealed today by Pacific Telephone manager Dick Pyle.

He noted that in 1947 the Fairfax exchange recorded 3600 telephones. Today it is estimated that there are over 12,500 in the Fairfax portion of Torrance.

The number of telephone calls recorded per day in 1947 were listed at a little more than 13,000. A recent figure set it at nearer 60,000 calls per day, an increase of 400 per cent.

Investment in telephone facilities the past decade ranged from \$452,000 in 1947 to nearly \$4 million today.

Pyle went on to say that the company's tax picture has jumped 11 times in the past 10 years from a supposed high during 1946-47 of \$8039 to over \$90,850 in 1956-57.

## Board Adopts New Policies About Student Discipline

New policies relating to student discipline were adopted by the Torrance School Board. The measures were designed to clarify existing policies.

Under terms of the policies adopted by the board, students may be expelled for the following reasons:

1. Continued and wilful disobedience.
2. Open and persistent defiance of the authority of the teacher.
3. Habitual profanity or vulgarity.
4. Smoking or having tobacco on the school premises.

**Parents Liable**  
5. Defacing or otherwise injuring school property. (Parents or guardians are liable for wilful damage to school property by pupils.)

6. Membership in any secret fraternity, sorority, or club.  
7. Failure to abide by the regulations of the Board of Education and the schools under their charge.

8. Using, selling, or possessing narcotics on or near a school.

**Suspensions Possible**  
Students could be suspended from school for a period not to exceed two weeks for the above reasons, under a policy which received a first reading at the board meeting. Suspensions would be used in less serious offenses.

Another policy provides that students may be excluded from school if they are of filthy or vicious habits or if their physical or mental disabilities might be detrimental to the welfare of other students.

Students also may be exempted from school—that is, permitted to remain out—if their physical or mental condition is such as to prevent, or make inadvisable, studying.


