\$10,000,000 Chest Goal Said to Be 'Rock Bottom'

Sloganed by "Give the Most Where You Get the Most Out of Giving," the 1957-58 Community Chest campaign is under way with a goal set of \$10,300,000 for the support of 167 health and welfare services throughout the Los Angeles area of which the Harbor area is a part, Ernest Loebbecke, president of the Welfare Federation of the Los Angeles area, has announced.

According to J. A. Robinson, Harbor Area Chairman to meet the needs of an ever-growing community this is "a rock-bottom, minimum goal which we have every hope of over-subscribing in this fall's campaign."

Chest Need Grows "There is no ceiling on the

amount of money needed in an area which has an influx of thousands of new families every week," he stated. "We are concerned by the fact that many areas are unserved and many essential preventive services are not possible."

He went on to say that the Chest is the means of supporting 167 health and welfare services with one donation.

"Each year we must make up large amounts lost through deaths and removals from our area. Our gains have been substantial but not enough to keep up with the demands and with the necessity for preventive services. I am confident that our minimum goal this year will be generously over subscribed," he said.

GED Tests Extended to Nonveterans

The Board of Education of the Torrance Unified School District has extended General Education Development testing to non-veterans 21 years of age or older as partial requirement for earning a high school diploma. The test formerly applied only to veterans who received high school diplomas upon completing courses in U. S. History and U. S. Government.

Non-veterans will now have an opportunity to earn a maximum of 100 credits toward their high school diplomas by successfully passing a series of tests. In addition to the GED tests, non-veterans must complete, or have completed, at least one year of English and Mathematics and courses in U. S. History and U. S. Government.

Giving Studied

He explained that a schedule of generous giving has been developed for those who ask what their fair share should be. Nearly 7000 replied, and the results were tabulated by the Los Angeles Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco.

"We believe that the generous giving schedule for individuals and employes in business and industry will help us to raise the largest possible amount for our agencies and exceed our goal," he said.
