

Anti-Polio Funds Rated One of Top Legislative Achievements

One of the most constructive features of the recent session of the State Legislature in the realm of public health was state assistance in the campaign to curb and to control polio in California.

The Legislature appropriated \$3,000,000 for the program, which has reached its end. During a few short months more than 3,000,000 Californians between the ages of birth and 40 years were provided with polio shots in an effort to provide them at least with partial immunity from that dread disease. This program is far from complete, however.

While something like 4,000,000 shots were administered during this program, it is estimated that a total of 18,000,000 shots, or three each for all of the 6,000,000 Californians under the age of 40 years, will be required to insure the state-wide immunity that we seek.

Funds Provided

Our state mental hygiene program underwent close scrutiny during the session, as a result of which we provided additional funds for new buildings and other capital outlay purposes, for research, for an enlarged medical and technical staff, and for more creature comforts for those who

Square Dance Classes Held On Tuesdays

are patients in those state institutions.

Along that line, the Legislature approved state aid for local agencies that are willing to establish local clinics for the purpose of providing at-home treatment of their mentally ill. For that program the state will provide a total of \$850,000 in matching funds.

This type of state-and-community cooperation should result in a reduction in the flow of the number of patients to state hospitals, because so many of them may now be treated in their own cities or counties, and be able to reside at home—where a doctor can

Beach Plans

The acquisition of land for beaches and parks recreational purposes will be accelerated as a result of legislative action at the session. The Legislature passed, and the Governor approved a \$7,000,000 beaches and parks bill.

One of the more interesting but lesser known of the new laws passed at the session, which is of general interest, deals with a new procedure for the sequence in which constitutional amendments will be placed on our general election ballots.

Up to now, the secretary of state has enjoyed complete discretion in the numbering of such proposals, regardless of the particular category in which they have fallen.

Hereafter, constitutional amendments submitted by the Legislature will constitute the first group on the ballot, with the secretary of state still enjoying discretion in determining their sequence. At the last session, the Legislature approved seven such proposals, for the 1958 general election ballot, and it is likely that additional ones will be approved at any special session that may be called or at the regular budget session next spring.

Order Set

The next group on the ballot, under the new law, will be those submitted by way of initiative petitions. These petitions must carry the names of qualified voters equal to at least 8 per cent of the total vote cast at the last gubernatorial general election. Today, that 8 per cent amounts to 322,429 qualified signatures. These petitions hereafter will be placed on the ballot in the order that they qualify with the secretary of state.

The third group on the ballot would be referendums. Referendums, which are popular movements to amend some legislative action, require petitions carrying the names of qualified voters equal to at least 5 per cent of the total vote cast in the last gubernatorial election. In this instance a total of 201,518 such signatures are necessary to qualify a referendum proposal. They, too, would be placed in sequence on the ballot in the order in which they qualify.

Mrs. R. O. McCaskey and Mrs. Robert Gagliano, who led the drive for the street lights, reported that the cost of the four lights was about \$580, with each family paying \$30.
