Members of the Southwest Park Civic Assn. heard about the upcoming bond election at the group's meeting last Tuesday night.

NORTH TORRANCE GIRL SCOUTS VOTE TO SPLIT

The North Torrance Assn. of Girl Scouts has decided to divide into three groups, at least temporarily, because of the large growth in membership.

At the present time there are 772 girls in 53 troops in the area. The three groups will hold a joint meeting in February to consider the success of the division and a vote will be taken on whether to make the division permanent.

Division Helps
"The division will allow more time for individual help and better programming," Mrs. Maxine Ruckie, neighborhood chairman, said. "Day camp will be available to more girls, and with less troops, there will be more time for sharing, troop accounts, and troop problem service. This will allow for expansion in those areas where growth is anticipated.

The areas will be divided as follows:

Mrs. Maxine Reynolds will be in charge of the membership nominating committee and the Representative Council delegate will be Mrs. Laura Pesola. The third Tuesday of the month has been designated as the regular meeting night at Carr School with the first to be conducted Oct. 15 at 7:30 p.m.

Area III leader is Mrs. Nadine Wells. This area is east of Crenshaw between 190th St. and Redondo Beach Blvd., and includes Crenshaw, Arlington, Casimir and the proposed Lincoln and Hamilton schools. Campaign Against Unvented Heaters Launched in Area

A campaign to tell Los Angeles residents about unvented space heaters—their proper use and the dangers involved—has been launched following a joint meeting of city and county officials and representatives of the Southern California Gas Co.

The group mapped out a drive to educate the public on precautions to be observed in the use of unvented, unapproved heaters, and to urge their replacement wherever possible.

Attending the meeting at the gas company's Los Angeles headquarters building were officials from city and county

health, fire, and building departments, and the county coroner's office.

300,000 in Area
The meeting was called to meet the problems of fire and carbon monoxide poisoning presented by the continued use of an estimated 300,000 unvented space heaters in this area.

These unapproved heaters lack a flue connection to carry the products of combustion out of the house, and are not to be confused with modern, safe gas appliances and heating equipment, the group stressed.

During the past five years an education program to tell the public the dangers of such obsolete heaters has been carried out by these government agencies in cooperation with the local gas utilities and other civic groups.

Deaths Decline
Success of the program can be traced by the drop in the number of accidental carbon monoxide deaths caused by these heaters from an average of about 40 per year from 1948 through 1952 and 20 since that time.

"Although natural gas itself is not poisonous, dangerous quantities of carbon monoxide can result from improperly adjusted equipment or from heaters used over a long period of time in poorly ventilated locations," a spokesman for the gas company stressed.

People are urged to have their heating equipment checked by the gas company or a competent service agency before temperatures drop to the mid-40s, when most of the deaths occur, and to remember to leave a window open when using unvented heaters.
