Site on Lomita Blvd. Selected for Planned Osteopathic Hospital

The new Bay-Harbor Osteopathic Hospital will be located on Lomita Blvd. just east of Western Ave.

Glen Wymore, president of the non-profit organization sponsoring the hospital, said the directors are expected to ratify tonight the approval of the staff members and the site committee report selecting this six-acre site at Lomita Blvd. and President Ave.

The acreage is situated on a knoll on the north side of Lomita Blvd. and will give full parking facilities plus room to expand the hospital its initial 50-bed capacity and ties in with plans to make this the first hospital in the area with a roof heliport for helicopter ambulance service.

Approval Needed

Purchase of the site is subject to approval of the State Department of Health and the Hill-Burton fund committee which has voted a \$600,000 grant to help build the new facility.

A current fund drive seeks to raise at least \$300,000 as the community share to go with the Hill-Burton grant of state and federal money. Additional funds also are being

sought to cover the property cost and furnishing the hospital which will represent an investment of at least \$1,100,000, Wymore explained.

When completed, the hospital will provide employment for at least 125 persons with a payroll of \$50,000 per month. It will provide 24-hour emergency service plus out-patient clinics as well as full surgery and obstetrical service. More than 40 Osteopathic physicians and surgeons in the Lomita-Harbor City, San Pedro, South Bay, Torrance and Gardena area have pledged heavy financial support to the building drive.

Hospital Drive

Members of the Lomita-Harbor City Ministerial Assn., representing nearly a dozen churches of the area in which the hospital is to be located, have designated Sunday Nov. 3, as "Hospital Day," in an effort to aid the Bay-Harbor Osteopathic Hospital program.

Special services are planned for Nov. 3, with representatives of the Osteopathic Hospital group attending each church in the district, according to the Rev. James Burnett, president of the ministerial association.

December Bid Date for New Freeway Set

Proposed advertising for completion of the Harbor Freeway to 190th St. is next December, a spokesman for the State Division of Highways reported at a Palos Verdes Breakfast Club meeting Saturday.
